Tanzania

U.S. citizens must obtain a Tourist Visa for Tanzania prior to departure from the USA. Instructions are below for completing the application process. The Visa requirements for non-US citizens vary widely.

Rustic Pathways has partnered with G3 Global Services to provide support for the visa process and make this as simple as possible for you. For US Citizens and residents, G3 can assist with visa applications as well as passport renewals and additional pages (fee paid directly to G3). G3 will refer non-US residents to the appropriate embassy, consulate or resource as needed free of charge.

Instructions for US Citizens

To take advantage of G3 assistance, please follow the attached application and an instruction sheet from G3 Global Services as well as the attached application. Please note that there are additional requirements listed for travelers under age 18. If you have any questions or problems as you move through this process, please reach out to G3 directly at 888-883-8472 or RusticPathways@g3visas.com.

Should you choose to apply for your visa directly through an embassy or different visa service, please contact your personal travel advisor for the additional information needed. The online forms are valid for G3 Global Services only.

We recommend that you apply for your visa 6-12 weeks prior to your departure from the US. If you wish to apply for your visa more than 12 weeks in advance of departure, please email RusticPathways@g3visas.com to discuss your visa processing.

Also note, your passport should be valid for at least six months beyond your final session date. We also strongly recommend you have at least 3 to 5 blank pages available, as entrance requirements frequently change and you may be denied entry should these pages be unavailable.

We highly recommend you use certified mail or a delivery service such as FedEx or USPS Express Mail when sending your passport to a visa service. Please be sure to use a service that enables you to track your package and provides a delivery confirmation.

Instructions for Non-US Citizens

G3 is able to process visas for non-US citizens who reside in the US, and will provide guidance for travelers who reside outside the United States. African Wildlife Conservation

Join the efforts of young environmentalists and aspiring biologists all over the world as part of Rustic's Critical Issues environmental conservation program. Travel around Tanzania to aid in habitat restoration efforts, while you work alongside community members on projects that support development and conservation. Spend a day in one of Tanzania's national parks to see the animals you are protecting in their natural habitat. Cap off your trip in eastern Tanzania to collect forest data and see how the hands-on projects you assisted with are measured and evaluated. Return home an active global citizen and perhaps be inspired to do one thing each day to bring positive change to people, animals, and the environment in your community.

Components of a Critical Issues Program

- Deliberate Focus: Students explore specific global issues as they exist in communities around the world.
- 2. Pre-Travel Engagement: Prior to their arrival in the program's base country, students build an understanding of the issue their program focuses on through readings, film screenings, and ongoing learning opportunities.
- 3. Program Content and Discussion: Students progress through a curriculum comprised of activities, discussions, and debriefs designed to expand their understanding and exploration of key topics.

4. Program Staff: Program Leaders on Critical Issues programs have intimate local knowledge and an academic or professional background in the focus area.

Yellow Fever Vaccination Shortage Until Mid-2018

The Centers for Disease Control has announced a shortage in yellow fever vaccine within the U.S. through mid-2018. If interested in receiving this vaccine, please talk with your doctor and visit this website to find a travel clinic near you that has the vaccine. It is recommended that you always call the clinic before arriving onsite to verify their available supply. In relation to Rustic Pathways' programming, this shortage only affects students traveling directly from Peru to a Latin American country (including Costa Rica, the Dominican Republic, and Cuba).

Days 1 - 2

Your adventure in Africa begins as soon as you board the flight to Tanzania. Arrive at Moshi Airport (QSI) in the evening and settle into the guesthouse. Your Program Leaders will lead an orientation that will introduce you to the local culture and prepare you for an exciting adventure ahead.

Journey to the Coast

Day 3

Get to know your group and leaders through some icebreakers and dive into a discussion about conservation and the issues you'll be learning about throughout the program. Drive through the countryside, passing the beautiful Usambara Mountains as you head toward the coastal town of Tanga.

Meet Your Marine Conservation Partner

Days 4-5

Begin your service work in marine conservation as you meet your NGO partner, Mwambao, a locally based NGO that supports coastal communities. Mwambao develops and implements community-centered marine conservation projects with local coastal communities, with a special focus on empowering locals to be part of the environmental change in their own backyard.

Dive into service with one of Mwambao's coral reef recovery projects as you get your hands dirty constructing *reefballs*, artificial reefs made from cement that are proven to restore ailing coral reefs and create new fishing and tourism sites. Spend your afternoons relaxing and swimming in the ocean before settling down to reflect on the power of community-centered conservation.

Q Experience Beach Life

Day 6

Take a break from service as you observe Tanzania's traditional day of rest. Enjoy recreational activities on the beach nearby, or go into the quiet but charming nearby town of Tanga.

Operation Service Operation Service

Day 7

Construct your last reefballs. At the end of the day, say goodbye to your community partners at Mwambao, whom you have been working alongside with throughout your time in Tanga.

Sail the Indian Ocean

Day 8

Step aboard a *dhow*, and Arabic-style sailing boat, as you sail and snorkel the beautiful blue waters and sandy islands of the Indian Ocean. Keep your eyes peeled for seabirds, flying fish, and other marine life as you unwind and discover the marine habitats that you have been working this week to help restore and conserve.

Reflect and Travel to Moshi

Day 9

Sleep or journal as you drive to the small but bustling city of Moshi and get a good night's rest in a comfortable guesthouse. Share your reflection of your experiences so far in a mid-trip discussion at the guesthouse in the evening as you prepare for the next chapter of your conservation-based adventure.

Introduction to the Jane Goodall Institute

Day 10

Begin your next service project with the Jane Goodall Institute, a global nonprofit founded by the pioneering primatologist Jane Goodall that "empowers people to make a difference for all living things," and its youth-led community action program, Roots & Shoots. The founders and staff of Roots and Shoots will provide a broad introduction to wildlife conservation in Africa, and its many components – deforestation, soil science, data collection, community education, and community development. You'll soon learn that effective conservation entails addressing an ecosystem of related causes!

Immerse yourself in the local community with Roots & Shoots volunteers of similar age, who will work with you side-by-side. Head to a rural village on the slopes of the mighty Mt. Kilimanjaro, where you will learn about the community and partner with them on a development initiative. Possible projects include building fuel-efficient stoves, building trash cans, planting trees, or cleaning the litter scattered throughout the area. Participate in traditional cooking and harvesting, and end with a rousing song-and-dance routine!

Later, visit the pioneer institution of wildlife studies and ecotourism, Mweka. Drop in on a lecture and listen to one of Mweka's notable professors, who are reputed experts in this growing field in East Africa.

Continue Service on Mount Kilimanjaro

Days 11-12

As you've learned with your time with Mwambao and the JGI, one of the most important aspects of environmental and wildlife conservation is combining sustainable community development with community-led conservation. Contribute a project that supports these goals, working with your Roots & Shoots counterparts throughout the project.

▼ Tour a Coffee Plantation

Day 13

Explore the slopes of Kilimanjaro through a different lens today: sustainable agriculture. Trek through a local coffee plantation and learn about how sustainable agriculture plays a vital role in the mountain's watershed and climate. Taste some fresh brews then say your final goodbyes to your friends from Roots & Shoots.

Experience Safari

Day 14

Rise with the sun this morning and load up into your safari cars... you're going to Tarangire National Park! You'll spend the day driving through Tarangire, known for its high density of elephants and baobab trees. While observing Tanzania's resident mammals, like zebras, wildebeest, and gazelles, learn about animal behavior, conservation efforts, and human-wildlife interactions. On your last night, reflect on your trip and all of the experiences and friends you have made along the way.

Day 15

Enjoy a Swahili meal in town for your last taste of local cuisine, and then hit the markets and practice your bartering skills as you browse the stalls for popular souvenirs like paintings, Tanzania soccer jerseys, wood-carved masks, the Masai tribal blanket called a shuka, and more!

Return Home

Day 16

Return home to the loved ones who will greet you at the airport as you say goodbye to your newfound friends. Take a moment to pause and reflect on what you and your group accomplished, what challenged you, what you learned, and how you'll share your experience with others.
